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
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















When Benny got home, he would spend time with his Anaanatsiaq. One day he asked her, "Siaq, what is the Inuktitut word for banana?"

"Well Benny, we don't have a word for banana because bananas don't grow in the Arctic."


"Oh," Benny pondered, "like how in English we use the Spanish word salsa, since there wasn't a word for it before?"

"Exactly," Anaanatsiaq confirmed.




